Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in the District's key industries, like:

- real estate and construction
- health care and life sciences
- technology
- professional services



DC Career Conversations is a web-based tool where industry professionals, CTE students and teachers connect by live video.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in the District of Columbia, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, the District had:


