

Designed to provide the entrepreneurial and technical skills necessary to manage a profitable, environmentally sound, community based small farm or agricultural business.

Computer Engineering Technology

Includes instruction in principles of mechanics, applications to specific engineering systems, design testing procedures, prototype and operational testing and inspection procedures, manufacturing system-testing procedures, test equipment operation and maintenance, computer applications, critical thinking, planning and problem solving, and oral and written communications.

Sustainable Agriculture

Focuses on agricultural principles and practices that, over the long term, enhance environmental quality, make efficient use of nonrenewable resources, integrate natural biological cycles and controls, and are economically viable and socially responsible; and that may prepare individuals to apply this knowledge to the solution of agricultural and environmental problems.

NCACTE- Family and Consumer Sciences Division

Blast Off! We are now FCS!

You will notice a shift in the abbreviation used for Family and Consumer Sciences. As states, schools, higher education institutions, and agencies have developed their Family and Consumer Sciences programs, they have found it convenient to refer to the program with an acronym or abbreviation. There have been two "standard" ways of abbreviating Family and Consumer Sciences that have been

widely used: FCS and FACS. The field has been aware of some concerns about confusion that might arise with the two abbreviations. So, to eliminate those concerns and provide clarity and consistency for the field, we have all agreed to use FCS as the standard acronym or abbreviation for Family and Consumer Sciences. In many instances, you will find that using the full name spelled out as Family and Consumer Sciences provides the most clarity and we encourage, and in fact prefer, usage of the full name whenever possible. However, when it is necessary or preferable to use an acronym or abbreviation, please be sure to use the initials FCS. To provide the most clarity when referring to this field in documents, please use "Family and Consumer Sciences (FCS)" the first time the field is named in the document and then to use "FCS" in following passages. Thank you for supporting this move to increase clarity and consistency.


