

Education Corner:

Working on written events for DECA competition is always a challenge for students and advisors. Finding the time to plan, organize, and execute an event is time consuming. Writing the paper and preparing the presentation is even more time. It takes truly dedicated students to achieve the goal of completion. There are students across the state working diligently on these projects.

Incorporating these projects into your class requirements is key to having quality projects for competition. To get started, just choose 2 or 3 events and print off the guidelines for the event. Have students form groups of 3 to work together. It will be a semester long project. Set a timeline for completion dates. I required my students to select small, local businesses as their focus because they are more willing to share data and support our students. It helps if students have a personal connection like a parent's company or a friend of the family.

Getting started and just deciding to add this project is really the hardest part. Once you get started, the details fall into place. I set deadlines for business contact and research. I had them create their own primary data as well as using secondary data for research. With social media, it is so easy to do your own survey. We used Survey Monkey because it is free. I am making the paper due before Christmas and their presentations will be due 3rd week in January. It hasn't been as hard as I thought it would be.

My students have enjoyed the challenge. They have connected with the Real World aspect of the assignment. They are learning the curriculum with hands on experience. I am sharing my experience because I took too long to incorporate written events as a project. I was afraid it was more than I could handle. I went to several PD's about written events and I always felt it was too challenging. It is NOT! It has been a wonderful learning experience for me and my students.

At the state level, she has chaired the Ways and Means Committee, the Professional Development Committee, the Strategic Plan Committee, the Membership Committee and the Resolutions Committee at various times throughout her thirty year membership. She has also had the privilege of serving as NCACTE President in 2006-2007. She comments, "Boy, did I pick the right year to be president! I represented North Carolina at the Region II Conference in the Bahamas that year and at the ACTE National Conference in Las Vegas." She served a four year term as North Carolina's representative to the Region II Policy Committee. 



