

POST CONFERENCE REPORT









"Gear Up & Take Off with CTE" was this year's conference theme. The Association for Career and Technical Education (ACTE) Region III Conference was hosted by the Indiana ACTE Association. The six states that comprise the Region III area are Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa, Missouri, Illinois, and Indiana. The states rotate the hosting duties of the




Figure 1 (Source: ACTE)

Region III Conference. Figure 1 shows the reported attendance for the last five years by host state.

The number of registered attendees at the 2017 conference was 121 guests. This is a 73 percent increase in attendance over the last conference hosted by Missouri. Figure 2 below shows Indiana hosted guests from 11 states; all six Region III states were present along with Florida, New York, Oklahoma, Michigan, and Virginia.

ACTE Region III Conference Attendance History





CONFERENCE PROGRAM







Once our objectives were set, the planning team selected a hotel near the airport and many of the conference venues that provided free shuttle service to/from the airport and free parking for those driving in from neighboring states. We negotiated a fair rate of \$99 per night + tax per sleeping room. Some might argue that we should have selected a downtown hotel. We felt parking, sleeping rooms, conference room usage, and food and beverage requirements would have cost substantially more downtown.



Patrick Biggerstaff was instrumental in procuring the Vincennes University (VU) Aviation Technology Center (ATC) for our concurrent session location based on its classroom set up and proximity to the hotel. Mike Gehrich, Director of Aviation, allowed for our attendees to use the classrooms, tour the facility, and experience the flight simulators.



The next step was to create the conference schedule and format. We wanted to incorporate industry tours that would encompass the 16 career clusters and therefore have "something for everyone". The transportation logistics alone proved to be a challenge, but the team was determined to make these experiences a reality. We started working with catering and transportation personnel from Wayne Township School Corporation as well.

We knew we wanted to start the conference with a "mixer" where attendees would discover commonalities with other attendees. This activity fostered much laughter and the beginning of networking opportunities. The committee arranged for a visit to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum and "Kiss the Bricks" tour. This was a huge hit with attendees. But we were not done yet! The next destination was Harry & Izzy's Restaurant downtown for a lovely dinner.

Immediately after dinner, attendees had the challenge to earn points via a "Wildgoose" game where teams formed and walked around downtown answering trivia questions, taking funny videos and pictures and incorporating the "locals" in the fun. Wildgoose is a London based company that specializes in teamwork events. Wildgoose worked with our team on the locations we wanted to showcase as part of the game. We designed the "finish line" to be at the Indiana State Museum. We planned with the museum to extend their "Canal Nights" family activities and have popcorn, sodas, and water for ready for our guests. After walking all over the city, getting into the air conditioning of the museum was a relief. Conference goers could see some of the museum area before loading the buses for the hotel.

Thursday, June 22, started at 7:50 AM with a light breakfast, several welcome speeches, a short leadership talk and dismissal to board buses for the ATC. Attendees listened to a short history presentation of the facility and then took a tour. Starting at 11:00 AM, attendees could choose 1 of 6 concurrent sessions. An Indiana themed lunch, including our state pie, Sugar Cream Pie, was provided by our caterer. A group photo was taken in front of VU's 737 aircraft. The RLAPS racecar simulator was available during lunch for those seeking a realistic adventure as an Indy car driver. At 1:00 and 2:00 PM, attendees could select 1 of 7 possible concurrent sessions. Figures 3, 4, and 5 below show which concurrent sessions were the most popular for each time slot.







From 3:00-5:00 PM, attendees preselected an industry tour from 7 choices. Again, these industry tours were selected based on the 16 career clusters. We had 7 buses disperse groups to these various locations. Figure 6 on the next page shows which locations had the greatest number of tour attendees.



The silent auction is a staple every year to raise money for the CTE Support Fund. This year's auction raised \$1,040.

The BAND app was utilized to send out reminders and notices to those attendees that downloaded the free app. Pictures, comments, and other useful information flowed freely with every post. This was a great bonus to the "backstage" chatter among the attendees. Everyone stuck around to watch the conference highlights PowerPoint before departing for home shortly before noon.

The spreadsheet below details all revenue received from registrations (electronic and paper), grants, sponsorships, and the hotel rebate. We incurred numerous expenses to provide this quality conference for all attendees; however, we still earned a net profit of \$19,750.70 that would be divided between ACTE and Indiana ACTE. We have decided to contribute \$124.65 to round the Region III profit contribution to ACTE to total \$10,000!!!!
