But oftentimes, that idealism is lost somewhere along the way and eventually teaching turns into a routine. It becomes less about educating and more about managing: managing students' behavior, managing parents' expectations (not to mention the expectations of the district, the principal, and the state!), managing grade-keeping, etc.

But being a teacher is about more than managing. It's even about more than educating.

Being a teacher is about editing.

The students you teach are telling stories with their lives: stories of pain and tragedy, of love and loss, and hopefully stories of triumph. But they need your help with those stories. They need help knowing what to keep and what to leave out, where to focus effort and where to use an eraser. They need an editor to help shape their stories.

In this workshop, Kyle helps educators get back to the things that brought them into teaching in the first place. He brings practical ideas and proven techniques for leaving your management-style education behind in favor of a job as Editor-in- Chief.
