It is always important to keep our finger of the pulse of the current legislation affecting the work that we do. In March, Missouri ACTE had a 25-member delegation participate in the National Policy Seminar. It was a great opportunity to say "thank you" to our Congressmen and Senators, remind them about the great work that Career and Technical Education does for kids, and to get a better understanding of the D.C. perspective. As we continue to be faced with the possibility of losing state funding, it will be additionally important that we continue to monitor the impact that our state legislative process will have on our mission. We will keep you posted on any legislation that will have major impact upon CTE.

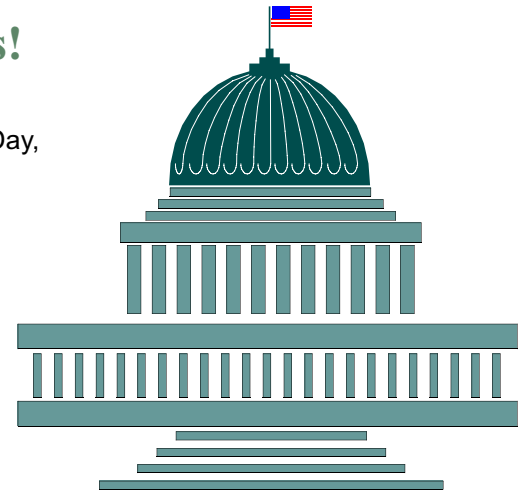

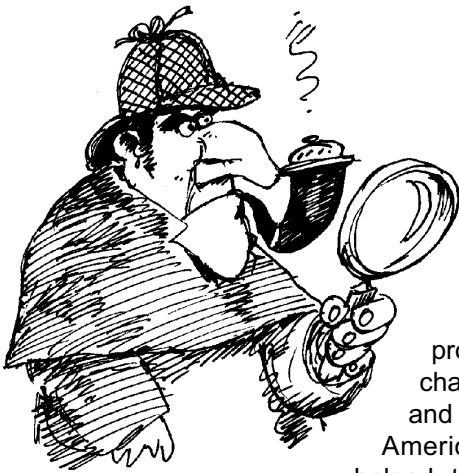
Tom plans for the future include spending time with his wife, Mary, their four children and eight grandchildren.
