We are fortunate to have Gary Duncan as our candidate for President-Elect. Gary has been a member of Missouri ACTE for 23 years and has served as President-Elect, President, and Past-President for both his Division, TEAM, and Missouri ACTE. He teaches Industrial Technology at the Moberly Middle School.

When he was asked about his philosophy of Career and Technical Education, he replied:

Career and technical education should be part of every student's education. I believe it should start early, certainly by middle school. At the middle school level, students should be given the opportunity to explore different career areas so they begin to have an understanding of what they are good at and what they like to do.

Exploration of careers should continue at the early high school level. As students begin to decide what career they want to pursue, advanced level classes should be available for students during their last two or three years of high school. Career and technical education should prepare students for jobs immediately after graduation, as well as preparing them to go on to a technical school or a four-year institution.

Career and technical education should be a vital part of every student's education. Career and technical education provides the opportunity for students to enter a career they will enjoy and be successful with the rest of their life.

We strive to plan enough projects to keep all expected volunteers busy. Occasionally, the number of volunteers may be greater than we can effectively utilize. If this happens, we may have to turn people away.

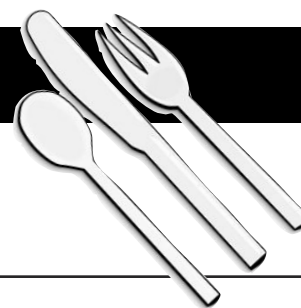
