To say Rusty is "on the move" is putting it mildly! His teaching assignment includes teaching Agriculture Science I at the Chillicothe High School for three periods. Then he travels to Southwest High School for one class of Agriculture Science I. After this period, he travels to the GRT and instructs an Agricultural Science I class for first year sophmores entering the GRT Ag program. Units in the curriculum include Leadership, Animal Breeding, Agricultural Mechanics, Record Keeping/SAE (Supervised Agricultural Experience), Animal Nutrition, Livestock Selection and a career development event.

Rusty is also active in the management of the Grand River Technical School Land Lab. His responsibilities include daily inspection and some maintenance of the facility.

Rusty also works with two other instructors to oversee daily care of the livestock and grounds. He is also very active in the procurement of funds to maintain and expand opportunities at the lab, as these monies are contributed privately, not provided by the school district.

Rusty is responsible for four career development teams; annually works with five or six students preparing for speaking contests; and works with students preparing for officer interviews at the Area and State level. He also works with the local Future Farmers of America (FFA) Alumni Chapter. The Land Lab has an oversight board and as the instructor, Rusty is responsible for their meetings and activities.

Rusty's major accomplishment has been his interest in students and the resulting increase in membership in the Agricultural Program at both of the schools where he has been employed. When he entered the profession at Nodaway-Holt High School in 1984, the FFA membership numbered in the low twenties. When he left the program, over seventy students were members of the local FFA.

Rusty has demonstrated, over and over again, his talents as a teacher and why he so richly deserves being named Missouri ACTE's 2003 Teacher of the Year. Congratulations, Rusty!

Keith serves as the Vocational Agriculture instructor and FFA advisor for over 100 students at the Lebanon Technology and Career Center. His contributions to the Lebanon community are vast and the majority involves the work and dedication of the students he has inspired. Here are a few examples:

 Lebanon Farm Fest - for the past nine years
staffs and maintains a petting zoo for children during the festival;

 Missouri Department of Conservation's Habitat for Wildlife project - gathers Christmas trees and assembles them with pallets to build wildlife habitats along the river for animals seeking refuge;

• Local fairgrounds - maintains the facilities, sets up the barns, and helps run the livestock judging contest each July at the Laclede County Fair; sets up the corral panels and timers, makes sure the American Cowboy Rodeo Association's Finals are ready to go when the first steer leaves the chute; and • Cowan Civic Center - sets up panels for the National Association of Breeders of Missouri Fox Trotting Horses and volunteered to construct an ice-skating rink for the Holiday Spectacular on Ice performance.

In addition, students in Keith's Agricultural Construction classes built bleachers as a community service project to be placed at the fairgrounds. This was a collaborative project between the city parks department and Carmeco, Inc., with a \$500 Building Our American Communities (BOAC) grant and the sweat equity of the students

Dog Dippin' Days was another community service project Keith and his students have performed. During the month of June, two dog-dippin' sites are established in town. FFA students and the advisor washed and dipped dogs belonging to people in the community.

Students are responsible for teaching farm safety techniques to fourth graders at Boswell Elementary School. The FFA students explain the dangers in operating various farm tools and equipment, as well as demonstrate safety rules for students' protection.

Keith's dedication to his students and his community has resulted in an improved quality of life for all those who pass through Lebanon, Missouri. We congratulate Keith on being named Missouri ACTE 2003 Outstanding Teacher in Community Service.

She is now serving her second term as Committeewoman of the 7th Ward.

Additionally, Maida is Vice-Chairman of the St. Louis City Democratic Central Committee. She sits on a variety of boards, many non-profit, and is a member of Central Baptist Church in St. Louis.
