

Career and Technical Education in Hawai'i

- Hawai'i is unique in that there is only one school district that covers all K-12 public schools and one postsecondary system that covers both community colleges and four-year colleges. Hawai'i delivers CTE through comprehensive high schools and seven community colleges.
- Hawai'i has implemented a robust dual credit program that serves all students, including those in CTE
 programs. The various initiatives have increased the number of students who enroll in college, increased the
 percentage of economically disadvantaged students who enroll and persist in college, narrowed the gap for
 economically disadvantaged graduates, and doubled the number of graduates with college credit since 2011.

In school year 2015-2016, Hawai'i served 29,654 CTE high school students and 8,935 CTE postsecondary students. In Fiscal Year 2016, Hawai'i received *\$5,496,906* in federal Perkins funding—the same as in 2015 and \$625,000 less than in 2010.

Exemplary CTE Programs in Hawai'i

- <u>Honolulu Community College's Music and Entertainment Learning Experience (MELE) program</u> is collaborating with the University of Hawai'i (UH) at Manoa and the University of Hawai'i at West Oahu in the creation of the Hawaiian language version of the hit animated Disney movie *Moana*. The three institutions above are all part of the Academy for Creative Media System (ACM). The movie is being recorded at the MELE sound studio at Honolulu Community College, and the students and alumni are manning the sound boards as the vibrant movie plays on monitors and the actors record their lines. "We could not be more excited to offer this unique educational opportunity for students and faculty from multiple UH campuses to work directly with the professionals at Disney Animation and Hawai'i's own Auli'i Cravalho in bringing *Moana* to Hawai'i in the Hawaiian language," said Chris Lee, founder and director of ACM. Other programs at the University of Hawai'i are looking to Kaua'i CC as a model of excellence as they prepare for their accreditation visits.
