

## **Free computers for students they get to keep – forever!**

High school drafting students are the future of North Carolina architecture. To prepare for a career in design requires a portfolio including designs using CAD software. Yet, up to 60% of students in rural counties don't have a computer at home powerful enough to run CAD. Classroom time at school is usually not enough to fully practice and master CAD, making advancement in the design field difficult or impossible.

**Project BauHow:** North Carolina Modernist Houses established Project BauHow to support the next generation of North Carolina architects. The program provides CAD-level computers and monitors to students to keep at home, does not require additional lesson plans, and runs a Modernist house design competition with scholarships to NC State University's Summer Design Camp. Teachers benefit from having nearly all students better equipped to work on assignments at home.

**Target Audience:** NCMH seeks teachers in high schools in rural North Carolina counties fostering a passion for architecture-based drafting.

**How it Works:** Drafting teachers apply online each spring. Selected schools receive CAD systems in the fall, delivered to the school. Then drafting teachers choose which deserving 9-11<sup>th</sup> grade students receive systems. Drafting teachers install their school's existing licensed software before students take systems home – to keep. There is no charge to the school, teachers, parents, or student. No home internet access is required for student participation; assignments are brought back and forth on USB sticks.

In return, drafting teachers agree to assign all drafting students a Modernist house design project. These designs are submitted to the Project BauHow competition each May which are juried by professional architects. One student at each selected school wins a scholarship to NC State's Summer Design Camp. Rising 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grade students attend a weeklong day camp. Rising 11<sup>th</sup> and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students attend a weeklong overnight camp. Scholarship winners also receive special trophies.

Schools have already been selected for the 2015-2016 year. **Applications for 2016-2017 will be available spring 2016.** There is no cost to apply, and the application takes less than 15 minutes online.






(Left) Sonar technology used on the Fishin' Frenzy vessel

### Times Are Changing

I want to share a number of things with everyone in this newsletter in reference to the email from Public Schools First NC about teacher pipeline on the decline and also share the activities that went on during our NCACTE Spring Professional Development Workshop in Atlantic Beach, North Carolina in February.

The Public Schools first sent out a recent email about teacher enrollment on the decline due to low salaries and that enrollment across the UNC system is down 30% since 2010. All of the UNC system schools have reported declines in enrollment in their degree and licensure programs. The result is a severe shortage of math and science teachers and middle school teachers for all subjects. This is a critical problem. The state estimates needing at least 10,000 new teachers across North Carolina already in the next school year.

Our teacher pay is below every neighboring state, making our ability to recruit teachers from other states highly unlikely. When we were closer to the U.S. median in teacher pay, we had considerable success in recruiting teachers based on Public Schools First.


The UNC system is so concerned about teacher pipeline shortage that they have launched a new recruitment website called TEACHE NOW, which is used to reach out to high school juniors and seniors, community college students, undecided majors at all UNC schools and mid-career professionals. The effort even targets military personnel and their spouses.

State Superintendent Dr. June Atkinson recently proposed a new effort to retain experienced teachers. She proposed a \$10,000 bonus for experienced teachers willing to work in low performing classrooms or in content areas with teacher deficits or they will coach new teachers. When we look at this from a broader perspective, teachers should use this as a tool to get salary increases for all teachers. If done the right way, we should be able to get a number of salary increases. Promoting what we do in a unified way and learning to band together as one is important if we are to remain in the classroom. We need people in office that have us and our families at heart.

A number of us have joined NCAE, but as a Career & Technical Educator, what you need to join is NC-ACTE. Ruth Huff is our new NC-ACTE Executive Director and Chrystal Cheek is the new NC-ACTE President. Their team is working really hard for NC-ACTE to increase membership in all divisions. We are happy to report that during the Spring Professional Development Workshop the Board of Directors voted to reinstate NC-ALIVE as a Division. We are in a probation year and have to get the qualifying number of members by August 2016 to keep our status as a Division, so please encourage your colleagues to become a member of NCACTE and our Division. NC-ACTE also has a lobbyist that rallies for CTE in the NC Legislature. We, as members, attend Legislative Day to talk to legislators about our jobs and programs. If we do not blow our own horn who will? You'll look up one day and your jobs will be gone. Some of you have experienced this change in your district already.

NC-ALIVE had its spring committee meeting during our NC-ACTE Workshop that was in Atlantic Beach in February. Most of our committee members attended and we finalized some activities for our professional development workshop, March 17-18, 2016. We also did some planning for the CTE Summer Conference that will be in Greensboro this summer. Our team is looking forward to seeing you at summer conference. - \*Shares problem solving techniques with others
- \*Three years' experience as an IMC
- \*Member of NCACTE IMC Division
- \* The previous year Regional IMCOY is not eligible for nomination (example the 2015 Regional IMCOY is not eligible for nomination in 2016)


