Blue Ribbon Task Force Update

The Blue Ribbon Task-Force has concluded its work and submitted their final report to Governor Daugaard on November 11, 2015. I encourage each of you to read the full report, which can be found at

The recommendations include the following.

- 1. Adopting a new K-12 funding formula based on a target for an average teacher salary of \$48,000 and maintain an average statewide teacher ratio of approximately 14:1. This recommendation includes replacing the current small school adjustment with a sliding scale, retaining the current statutory minimum inflation factor of 3% or the rate of inflation whichever is less, and re-evaluating teacher salaries every three years.
- 2. Providing at least \$75 million in new and ongoing funding for teacher salaries. This could include increasing the state sales and use tax.
- 3. Adopting accountability standards to insure districts are working to meet the goal of increased teacher salaries.
- 4. Authorize funds and create incentives to share personnel and state services in providing quality education.
- 5. Allocate funds for statewide innovations in learning. This includes doubling the e-Learning Center's course offerings, allocating funds for innovation in virtual learning and customized learning, and appropriating \$1 million in ongoing funds for learning innovations.
- 6. Recommendations for teacher recruitment and retention to include full reciprocity for teachers certified in another state, appropriating \$1 million annually for a statewide mentoring program for new teachers, creating a new teacher academy, and restoring funding for National Board Certification.
- 7. Additional changes recommended include reinstating the cap on general fund reserves. This recommendation includes phasing in the caps over a three-year period while establishing an oversight committee to help districts with the phase-in process. Additionally, the pension levy would be eliminated and other revenue streams not accounted for in the state funding formula, such as weigh station fines and wind farm fees/income be equitably distributed among all districts.

While no bills have been introduced at this time, there is discussion surrounding the Task Force's recommendation. After reviewing the full report, please visit with your legislators to share the impact the recommendations would have on your school/program.

In 2015, the program was extended to recognize students who demonstrate ability and accomplishment in career and technical education fields. 2016 U.S. Presidential Scholars will be selected by the Commission on Presidential Scholars and receive the

In memory of Gary Grey

Longtime CTE advocate and former liaison to the SDACTE Board of Directors, Gary Michael Grey, 65, of Pierre, passed away Monday, October 26, 2015 at Regional West Medical Center in Scottsbluff, NE, after a twelve-year struggle with Parkinson's disease.

He taught secondary agricultural education at Pierre and Miller and taught farm and ranch business management in the Pierre area until 1993 when he became State Supervisor of Agricultural Education and State Advisor to the State FFA Association. He served as State President to the Agriculture Teacher's Association and the state vocational education association. He was an officer and a charter member of the National Farm Management Association and served in a leadership capacity in many other areas dealing with agricultural education. He was named Outstanding Teacher in the SD Vocational Association and given the Honorary American degree by the National FFA.

Retired Ag instructor and good friend Myron Sonne shared this: "Gary was also instrumental in keeping PAS alive in SD and fought very successfully for the Ag programs within the Technical Institutes. He was deeply saddened when the programs at SE and WDTI were not sustained. I remember him keeping the vigil for Advisory Committees at all levels of technical education. We can thank him for many things as we remember his presence among us."

NAAE Workshops at ACTE Vision

I would like to thank SDACTE for providing the conference stipend to help me attend ACTE/NAAE VISION Conference in New Orleans, LA. This year's conference provided a wealth of opportunities to grow professionally and network with fellow CTE instructors. One of the best ways to learn is to attend workshops put on by your peers and there were plenty of opportunities for that at VISION!

I attended several workshops about topics such as giving effective directions, delegating responsibilities, backwards designed curriculum, preparing CDE teams, chemistry in agriculture, aerial drones, and math in agriculture. As there isn't room in this newsletter for information on all these workshops, I'll just share a little about a couple of them. The workshop "Moving Your Curriculum Forward with Backward Design" provided the opportunity to work in groups to design curriculum that is more student centered. My group backward designed a lesson in Natural Resources/Wildlife. We were guided through the process including starting with the end goal in mind, developing essential questions, and determining the appropriate information to provide students throughout the lesson. By the end of the workshop, the lesson was nearly complete and ready to use.

An interesting workshop called "Teaching and Coaching! Strategies for Career Development Event Preparation" provided insight into what some of the more successful CDE coaches do to prepare their teams for events. Although early in the research process, the presenters shared promising practices that they have gained through their study. The biggest factor presented is that all successful CDE coaches use instructional strategies while working with teams. Coaching for FFA events is not just teaching, but it is definitely not exactly the same as coaching athletics. Rather, it takes skills in both areas to be successful.

There are so many opportunities to improve as professional educators at ACTE VISION. I encourage members to attend the conference in Las Vegas next year and utilize the SDACTE Conference Stipend to help fund your experience.
