Gaining Legislative Insight by SDACTE President-elect Jim Wilson

On March 10 - 12 I had the opportunity to travel to Washington D.C. to represent our state association at the National Policy Seminar. NPS is an opportunity for members to gain a better understanding of how to communicate effectively with legislators and policy makers. The seminar and information given was broken down into five sections.

- Advocacy- tips and tools for building effective relationships.
- Legislative Process- how policy is set and laws are enacted.
- Resources and research-up-to-date research and resources
- Issues briefs- policy background information needed for a successful hill visit.
- Hill Visit Info- we were given leave behinds for our legislators.

All the information presented during the seminar led up to actually visiting the legislators on the hill. The South Dakota delegation included



myself, Dodie Bemis, and Coleen Keffeler. We met with aides to all three of our legislators John Thune was the only legislator able to attend our meetings. That doesn't mean that our visit was not effective. In each case we were able to have conferences with the legislator's aides assigned to educational matters. I think that our visit was valuable in the sense that we gave them a better understanding of the importance of Perkins Funding to our state, gave them examples of how it is used on the state level, and gave them information as to why they should support CTE. Each showed strong support.

All things considered it was a valuable trip for me. I have a better understanding of the process and realize the important role that aides have. This makes me realize I can make a difference without directly talking to our legislators in person. Advocacy is very important to the continuation of state and federal funding for our programs and I encourage all members to take advantage of programs like this to become more informed.

I just returned from Region 5 ACTE Convention held April 8th thru the 12th in San Diego, CA. The California group of ACTE did a wonderful job in hosting the convention.



I would like to share with you in this article a small portion of activities available to attendees. Tuesday was the day scheduled for a day long tour of three selected area career schools and they are listed below.

<u>High Tech High</u>

The morning started out by boarding a charted bus to take a short drive to High Tech High located in the central part of San Diego. The school is a champion of integration of career education with academics. The school is on a block system with career programs linked with academic areas. High Tech High was started in the fall of 2000 through the collaboration of industry people and educators in the San Diego area to create this unique educational system. For students to be admitted into the school

they will need to apply and get accepted through a lottery of available slots to attend. All students attending the school will complete an internship during their junior year. One of the areas discussed during the visit at the school was the engineering sequence and how it relates to the school's math coursework. Mission Hills High School

Mission Hills High School is one of the newest high schools in the San Diego area. The school was opened in August 2004. The school is located approximately 30 miles north of downtown San Diego in a hilly area and sits on a former dairy farm. The school buildings surround an interior courtyard and outside amphitheater where students and teachers can congregate during free time. The focus of the school is on a high achievement linking the sciences and arts with career education. Mission Hills has approximately 1700 students with a full range of athletics and activities for individuals attending.

Mission Hills Career and Vocational Education Department focuses on three primary areas:

- 1. Academies: Culinary Arts, Health Care, and Public Safety
- 2. Business: Introduction to Business, Word Processing and Retail Marketing
- 3. Computer Technology: Computer Applications, Computer Explorations, Graphic

Design/Desktop Publishing, Multimedia and TV News Production.

Ramona HS is one of the oldest schools the San Diego area dating back to 1894. The enrollment is approximately 1970 students in a four year curriculum. Career classes are offered in the areas of: business, computers, auto mechanics, auto repair, small engines, drafting, food trades, welding, landscaping construction, and veterinary assistant. After completing our meal we went on a tour of the Agriculture Program, then off to the Automotive Program and finally visiting the Video Production area which has developed an Internship Program with linkages to the movie industry in California.
