At the CTE Academy in Sioux Falls, students enrolled in Project Lead The Way Engineering courses have new, exciting and cutting-edge opportunities both inside and outside the classroom with the addition of VEX® Robotics. VEX® Robotics equipment is a high quality platform with broad functionality that allows students to create more innovative solutions to problems. Not only will students use the equipment during the school day when everyone can participate, they will also have the ability to take part in the VEX® Robotics Competition, the largest and fastest growing middle and high school robotics competition in the world. These competitions allow students to apply their robotics knowledge from the classroom in a unique, problem-solving environment.

Introduction to Engineering Design students have incorporated the use of VEX® Robotics as they learn to

use 3D modeling software to build virtual models of the robots as they are assembling them in the lab. Robot designs include: a tumbler robot that can flip over at a wall and then drive upside down, a tank robot and a robot with an arm that can pick up a ball and score it in a goal. Robots can be controlled with a joystick or can be preprogrammed to drive in autonomous mode to navigate a predetermined course.

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Putting SDMyLife to Good Use—By Brenden Streitz, Division President

Matt Gappa is a seventh year *Introduction to Information Technology* teacher in Flandreau. This past summer at the South Dakota Association of Career and Technical Education (SDACTE) conference, Gappa attended a breakout session on SD My Life. He integrated new ideas into his curriculum using SD My Life with his freshman students.

In Gappa's database unit, students research the price of houses, the price of cars, interest rates, and various careers. They then create a database to store information relating to these areas. In the past, the information on careers came from various web sites. This year, he had the students use SD My Life to research careers suggested to them from their matchmaker questions.

Gappa's students then used the information on their chosen careers to populate their database with information about their careers. The students made calculated queries that determined which careers allow them to afford the houses and cars of their choice. They also examined how a change in interest rates, or a change in the period of time a house/car is financed, affects the affordability of the house/car. The objective is to teach students database basics as well as provide the students with valuable information that can help them better plan for their futures.

Spotlight on T & I

As career and technical educators, we have the unique opportunity to help young people find their true calling in life as well as develop the necessary skills to be successful at whatever that calling might be. We also are blessed from time to time with unique individuals who have the potential to change our lives and the lives of those around them in powerful ways. These students are sometimes academically gifted, social leaders of the class, who tackle new challenges with passion and determination. Sometimes the students who impact us the most are the ones who enter our classroom with emotional baggage and an "I dare you to teach me something useful" attitude. Brandon Mehlbrech was just such a student in the 2010 graduating class at Mitchell Technical Institute.

Brandon started the program in the fall of 2008 after completing a tour of duty in Iraq with the South Dakota National Guard unit from his hometown of Salem, SD. Like several of his classmates who had served and returned to attend classes at MTI, reintegrating and adapting to college life and school was a challenge. Brandon struggled with the reading assignments and the theory portions of the lesson, but excelled at the practical exercises in the lab. His natural aptitude and ability to think mechanical problems through during practical testing made him one of the top students in the class for those "hands-on" sessions.

After completing graduation in May of 2010, Brandon decided to return to the Middle East along with the 200th Engineering Co. MRBC from South Dakota. During the transition back into active duty, it was noted by Brandon's' superiors that he had completed his training at Mitchell Technical Institute as a small engine/ ATV and motorcycle technician. This information was relevant because the battalion utilized John Deere gator type utility vehicles for their light duty transportation needs. Brandon was asked to take on the challenge of maintaining this unique group of vehicles.

To date, Brandon maintains a fleet of eight gators along with his other equipment service duties. He changes oil every 75 hours and replaces air and fuel filters bi-weekly. Brandon's training and practical experience at MTI made the development of an effective maintenance program very easy and helps him stay efficient at his duties as a service technician.

Be Pro-Active

Governor Daugaard recently gave his budget address for Fiscal Year 2013. He recommends a 2.3% increase in state aid funding formula compared to last year's allocations. Governor Daugaard's budget also includes an additional 2.2% in one time funding. This equates to a proposal increased funding of \$9.8 million in ongoing aid, \$4 million in one-time funding, and \$8.4 million in one-time funding for staff/administrator training in areas related to the common core standards, evaluations, and other professional development needs. Additionally, the budget proposal includes a .9% increase for Board of Regents schools. On the national level, Congress is still working on the Final FY2012 Appropriations Bill and Assistant Secretary Brenda Dann-Messier of The Office of Vocational and Adult Education provided attendees with a preview of the Department of Education's early thoughts about a new Perkins Act. Please read and respond to ACTE staff e-mails and updates. Information is available at http://www.actconline.org/legislativeupdates.aspx

So, what does this mean to you, a SDACTE member? **Be pro-active**. Read and follow through on requests for information, letters, and testimony when asked by the SDACTE Board and/or ACTE staff. Review and analyze your local data. Put that data into an easy-to-read format and share it with your local stakeholders (i.e. advisory board, parents, administrators, and school board members), as well as your area legislators, and congressional delegation. As you have heard before, anecdotal stories are great, but we need the data to back it up.

The SDACTE Legislative Committee will be following education and funding bills closely. **Please**, when that e-mail comes asking for action, take five minutes to make the requested contacts. It is also important to provide information on how specific bills would impact local CTE programs. Educate your business partners and advisory board members; understanding how proposed legislation impacts local programs helps them in their contacts with legislators as well.

The SDACTE Data brochure is in the process of being updated for your use as well. Share the statewide data and include your local data.

These are critical times for career and technical education. Speak up! Share the successes of your local programs! Be Pro-Active!


This is the logo for the newly-designed ACTE National Conference. The Conference is being renamed in 2012 to the CareerTech Summit.
