The annual summer conference was held in Rapid City on July 29-31. It had been 33 years since our conference was held in Rapid City and we had over 200 members attend this year. We kicked off the conference with a social event at the Main Street Square in downtown Rapid City. Wall Meat Processing roasted a whole hog and served pulled pork along with salads and fruits. What a great way to start conference getting to socialize with our members. A scavenger hunt was organized by Rapid City area CTE teachers and teams of four participated in the event with a good number of our members taking part in this activity.

Our conference opening session was held on Monday morning at Western Dakota Technical Institute. Brooks Harper was the keynote speaker and his high-energy speech focused on preparing students to be globally competitive. We as CTE teachers can help our students discover their talents, skills and abilities and help them develop those to be valuable in the workplace. Breakout sessions filled the rest of the morning and our SDACTE committees had a chance to meet during lunch. After lunch, each of the divisions had time to meet and conduct business. 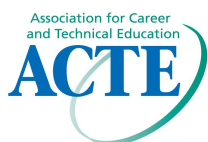
