

CTE in Indiana



The Indiana economy is experiencing a skills gap...

58% of jobs in Indiana require skills training—more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

47% of Indiana workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Indiana's key industries, like:

- aerospace and aviation
- agriculture
- energy
- advanced manufacturing



94% of Indiana secondary CTE concentrators met performance goals for technical skills in 2018.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Indiana, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, Indiana had:

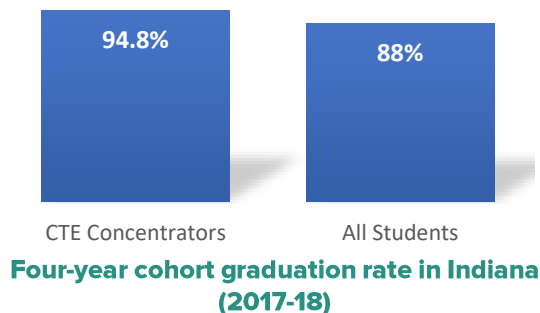

These youth and adult learners in CTE programs are more engaged, graduate high school at higher rates, earn industry-recognized credentials, and have rewarding and family-sustaining careers.
