of jobs in North Dakota require skills training-55% more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

50% of North Dakota workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in North Dakota's key industries, like:

- energy
- agriculture
- aviation

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in North Dakota, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, North Dakota had:


