## **CTE in New Hampshire**

The New Hampshire economy is experiencing a skills gap...

- **52%** of jobs in New Hampshire require skills training more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.
- **43%** of New Hampshire workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in New Hampshire's key industries, like:

- advanced manufacturing
- technology
- health care and life sciences
- tourism and outdoor recreation

96% of New Hampshire postsecondary CTE concentrators met performance goals for technical skills in 2018.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New Hampshire, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, New Hampshire had:


