of jobs in New Jersey require skills training—more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

37% of New Jersey workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in New Jersey's key industries, like:

- transportation, distribution and logistics
- manufacturing
- technology
- construction and energy

94% of New Jersey postsecondary CTE concentrators met performance goals for technical skills in 2018.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New Jersey, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, New Jersey had:


