45% of Florida workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Florida's key industries, like:

- aviation and aerospace
- manufacturing
- logistics and distribution
- clean tech

Florida high school students earned 168,576 Career and Professional Education (CAPE) industry certifications and digital tool certificates in 2020-21.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Florida, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, Florida had:


