## CTE in New York

The New York economy is experiencing a skills gap...

of jobs in New York require skills training—
more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

**37%** of New York workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in New York's key industries, like:

agribusiness

fields.

- clean tech and renewable energy
- industrial machinery and systems
- materials processing

In 2018, 98% of New York high school CTE students pursued postsecondary education, entered the workforce or joined the military after graduation.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New York, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2019-20 school year, New York had:


