SDACTE Celebrates 50 Years

For fifty years, SDACTE has been providing leadership and assistance to educators in developing a prepared and competitive workforce. To get a better idea of how SDACTE got its roots to grow, Myron Sonne, a 43 veteran CTE/Ag Edu instructor was called upon for information.



In the beginning, forward-thinking Vocational Education Instructors Larry Venner, an Ag Educator from Wessington Springs and later Pierre High School, and Ike Olson, perhaps the Director of Vocational Education in Pierre, got together to activate the state organization as a part of the American Vocational Association, or AVA for short. Divisions included Home Economics, Agriculture, and Industrial Arts. Mr. Venner, Mr. Olson, and other like-minded influential Vocational Educators determined there was power in numbers: the broader the base of similar educators, the more respect and ability there would be when trying to make positive educational change through governing boards and politicians. By 1998, the AVA transformed into what we know ACTE to be today, encompassing a wide variety of divisions to support educators and rigorous programs for today's youth to be competitive in our ever-changing economy and workplace.

Before becoming a member of SDAVA (SDACTE), Sonne was a member of an organization for Agriculture Educators. He spent three years teaching at Letcher High School and 40 years at Mitchell Area Vocational Technical School/Mitchell Technical College (with some other names in between). When SDAVA was first organized, the biggest concern was the idea of dues, membership, and the registration cost of a yearly conference. At the time, it was hard to understand the benefit of Unified Dues. However, some of his favorite memories of being a life-long member of professional organizations include the socials, fundraising, and the awards banquets.

This year does mark the 50-year anniversary and the board of directors is hopeful that this year's conference will be informative and engaging. A great social is planned for Sunday evening as a kick-off to two packed days of professional development. There will be plenty of opportunities for networking, learning, and sharing. As 55-year member Sonne says, "Why stop now?"

ACTE Educators Focus on Student Success

April 6-9, over 160 ACTE members from across 13 different states met in Rapid City to participate in the Region V ACTE Leadership Conference held at the Rushmore Plaza Holiday Inn. Participants were able to participate in general sessions, leadership development sessions, round tables, breakout sessions and tours to share and collect best practice ideas and network. The focus for this year's conference was "Portraits of Success," acknowledging successes and opportunities within today's emerging technologies and career paths for learners. Participants had the opportunity to learn about various CTE areas local to the Black Hills of South Dakota. Tours included Mt. Rushmore, Black Hills Pioneer, Deadwood Hospitality & Tourism, Western Dakota Technical College's Law Enforcement and Health Services program, C-Lock Inc. and RPM Industries. After their tours they were treated to a unique South Dakota restaurant for dinner. Friday's agenda included a large variety of breakout sessions for participants and the evening Region V ACTE awards banquet was held at Crazy Horse with a traditional Native American drum and dance experience and dinner. Saturday morning each state in the region had the opportunity to participate in a Best Practices in CTE Networking exchange with 12 of the states participating. Amongst all of these exciting and educational opportunities, registrants were also able to visit with nearly 20 exhibitors in all areas of CTE. Finally, each of the general sessions featured a local speaker ranging from the President & CEO of Elevate Rapid City to Ray Hespen, the CEO & co-founder of Property Meld. Attending the ACTE Region V conference seemed like a great opportunity to hear new techniques in CTE education from across Region V. With so many people across so many states living in Region V and the relative ease of attending the conference being hosted in South Dakota, it was something I could not pass up. After attending the conference, I can attest that it was well worth the time.

There were numerous ideas presented that were interesting and will be helpful to me. Early in the conference, I attended a tour of the Western Dakota Tech's program in Law & Public safety. This included a lot of content in the health careers. I was impressed with the scope of their program and the various money saving and practical ideas they had including making contacts with local practitioners.

Similarly, the work-based learning simplified presentation by Lori Christensen gave me further hints on how to make contacts and let the business/organization use their own experience to help dictate the curriculum the students will follow as they complete their on-the-job training.

I also attended a talk on behavior management. The "Add Some 'Tools' in Your Behavior Management Tool Box" by Katie-Jo Ramirez & Kari Van Zee was very helpful in offering some new ideas. The idea of the treasure chest for good behavior and other accomplishments could be very effective with my students I think.

The Best Practices in CTE Networking Exchange was perhaps the best opportunity to learn ideas from other programs across Region V. I got some great ideas on how to individualize content for programming and even some ideas to incorporate 3-D animation with the programming thanks to Tony Sharpe from Washington.

Alyssa from Hawaii talked about a program to cultivate seaweed at their school. This developed into a successful commercial enterprise. Not only did students get a chance to assist in running a program that was very successful from a business perspective, but they were able to connect with a part of their own culture as Native Hawaiians. This kind of culturally connected business enterprise seems relevant in South Dakota in terms of preserving Lakota and other cultures that make up the people of this state and could serve as inspiration for programs here.

Aside from the great presentations and networking exchanges, there were some great speeches from the likes of V.J. Smith, Tom Johnson, Ray Hespen & Beth Buckwalter. They offered varied perspectives on success in teaching, inspiring, and achieving in education, CTE and CTE-related fields. There was excellent food provided including breakfast, lunch and dinner. These meals not only served to keep us fed but also served to give us a chance to chat and get to know fellow CTE teachers from across the country. This allowed us to be able to trade ideas and just relate to each other's experience of being a CTE teacher. A highlight would have to be the evening of the awards ceremony after going out to the Crazy Horse Monument and getting to

watch some traditional Lakota dances. Star Chief Eagle did a great job as emcee and one of the main dancers as did the other performers. Also, congratulations to the award winners in Region V.

Update on the CTE Standards. Amy Miller, SD DOE

A brand new set of CTE Standards were just approved at the May 6th Board of Education Standards meeting after a series of public hearings this past year. Thank you to everyone that invested their time and talents to bring these standards current with our state's workforce and educational needs. The newest version of these standards will be posted soon. Here are the highlights of the changes.

Ag, Food, and Natural Resources

- A common set of Supervised Agriculture Experiences (SAE) standards were added to the standards of almost every AFNR course.
- A new SAE course was proposed and developed, for students that complete a Supervised Agriculture Experience outside of classroom time.
- A set of safety standards covering the proper use of equipment and tools was added to the standards of almost every AFNR course.
- Changes were proposed to the AFNR Environmental Science course, including retitling the course to Issues in <u>Environmental Science to</u> distinguish it from its science counterpart.
- Changed Advanced Horticulture to Horticulture Operations to better reflect the range of horticulture areas • represented in the course.

Arts and A/V

- The importance of universal design and ADA compliance in many areas related to media, graphics, and beyond.
- The importance of employability and industry skills.
- Legalities around the design industries including laws and legal concepts that industry members would need to • know.
- Updated terminology and increased industry connections.
- Standards for Interior Design I and Interior Design II were adjusted to distinguish between the two levels and to add universal design and sustainable practices.
- The course title Visual Communications was changed to <u>Visual Media Design</u> to better distinguish it from a course with a similar title in fine arts.
- The pathways were streamlined to just three pathways that best suit the industry needs and interests of students in • South Dakota. The three new pathways are: A/V Technology & Film, Journalism and Broadcasting, Visual Arts

Finance

- Change Advanced Accounting to Accounting II
- Change Specialized Accounting to Advanced Accounting .
- Change Banking Services to Principles of Banking
- Change Introduction to Financial Services to Introduction to Financial Industries
- Change Risk Management and Insurance to Principles of Insurance

Health Science

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- Change Health Science Careers I to <u>Health Science Careers I: Exploration</u> Change Health Science Careers II to <u>Health Science Careers II: Engagement</u> Change Certified Nursing Assistant to <u>Gateway to Certified Nursing Assistant</u> to emphasis that students will have addition steps beyond completion of this course to receive a CLNA licensed.
- Change Pharmacy Technician to Introduction to Pharmacy Technician this course is an introductory-level course for this pathway so the course title will clarify the scope of the course content.

Human Services

- Fundamental Food Concepts (16052) was added to the Family & Community Services/Mental Health Services Pathway in order to address content knowledge needed in the field.
- Course title Consumer Affairs was changed to Consumer Resources and Management. The course was updated to reflect more current themes, industry expectations, and career opportunities related to supporting consumer issues in Human Services areas.
- Course title Relationships across the Lifespan was changed to Lifespan Connections to better reflect the updated . standards and purpose of this course.

The next round of standards revisions will begin in June. This year Business Management and Administration, Marketing, Transportation, Hospitality and Tourism, and Capstone will be up for review. The revision team members have already been selected but we invite everyone to leave their feedback and suggestions for changes via these surveys.
