## CTE in Washington, DC

The District of Columbia's economy is experiencing a skills gap...

of jobs in the District require skills training—
more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

**21%** of District workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in the District's key industries, like:

- technology and innovation
- hospitality and tourism
- higher education and health care
- retail and restaurants

More than 40% of DC high school CTE concentrators who graduated in 2021 had participated in an internship, pre-apprenticeship, apprenticeship or cooperative education experience.


Many students are already enrolled in CTE in the District of Columbia, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, the District had:

**3,724** secondary CTE participants

postsecondary CTE participants

1.113

These youth and adult learners in CTE programs are more engaged, graduate high school at higher rates, earn industry-recognized credentials, and have rewarding and family-sustaining careers.
