

CTE in Florida



The Florida economy is experiencing a skills gap...

54% of jobs in Florida require skills training—more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

45% of Florida workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Florida's key industries, like:

- information technology
- manufacturing
- logistics and distribution
- cleantech



Florida high school students earned 168,576 Career and Professional Education (CAPE) industry certifications and digital tool certificates in 2020-21.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Florida, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, Florida had:

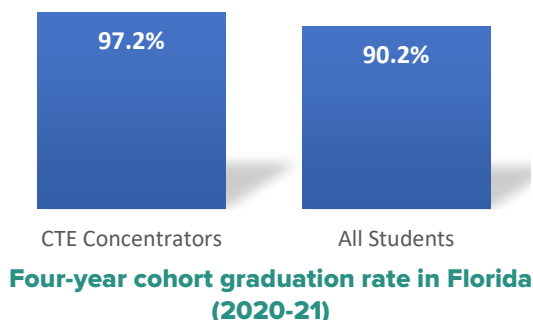
