The New Hampshire economy is experiencing a skills gap...

of jobs in New Hampshire require skills training—
more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

43% of New Hampshire workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in New Hampshire's key industries, like:

- advanced manufacturing
- technology
- health care and life sciences
- tourism and outdoor recreation



The New Hampshire Career Academy offers high schoolers a tuition-free program leading to an associate degree and/or industry-recognized credential and a job interview with a New Hampshire employer.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New Hampshire, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, New Hampshire had:



These youth and adult learners in CTE programs are more engaged, graduate high school at higher rates, earn industry-recognized credentials, and have rewarding and family-sustaining careers.
