The New Jersey economy is experiencing a skills gap...


- **52%** of jobs in New Jersey require skills training more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.
- **37%** of New Jersey workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in New Jersey's key industries, like:

- information technology
- manufacturing
- pharmaceuticals
- transportation and logistics

In 2021, 98% of New Jersey high school CTE concentrators and completers pursued postsecondary education, entered the workforce, or joined the military or Peace Corps immediately after graduation.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in New Jersey, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, New Jersey had:
