## **CTE in Tennessee**

The Tennessee economy is experiencing a skills gap...

- **56%** of jobs in Tennessee require skills training more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.
- **49%** of Tennessee workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Tennessee's key industries, like:

- electric vehicle manufacturing
- health care and life sciences
- appliances and electrical
- distribution and logistics

7,210 Tennessee high school CTE concentrators who graduated in 2021 had participated in a workbased learning course.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Tennessee, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, Tennessee had:




