## **CTE in Vermont**

By 2040, Vermont will need

**10,000** additional workers per year.



Career and technical education (CTE) programs can prepare this workforce, particularly in Vermont's key industries, like:

- manufacturing
- food and beverage
- outdoor recreation
- health care

In 2021, 94% of Vermont high school CTE concentrators pursued postsecondary education, entered the workforce, or joined the military or Peace Corps immediately after graduation.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Vermont, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, Vermont had:



These youth and adult learners in CTE programs are more engaged, graduate high school at higher rates, earn industry-recognized credentials, and have rewarding and family-sustaining careers.
