The Alabama economy is experiencing a skills gap...

more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

47% of Alabama workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Alabama's key industries, like:

- aerospace and aviation
- agricultural products and food production
- automotive
- metal and advanced materials



In 2020, CTE students in Alabama earned more than 22,000 industry-endorsed credentials.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Alabama, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, Alabama had:


