The Nevada economy is experiencing a skills gap...

of jobs in Nevada require skills training—
more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

48% of Nevada workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Nevada's key industries, like:

- health
- information technology
- manufacturing and logistics
- tourism and gaming



High school CTE completers can earn no-cost postsecondary credit that articulates to four of Nevada's community colleges through the CTE College Credit program.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Nevada, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2020-21 school year, Nevada had:


