Improving Perkins Performance Indicators with Emphasis on Credentialing

Perkins funding is allocated from the federal government and distributed through each state's department of education to secondary and postsecondary institutions to strengthen career and technical education (CTE). Each year postsecondary institutions are required to meet three performance indicators: postsecondary placement, earned recognized postsecondary credential, and non-traditional program concentration.
