CTSO Revitalization Grants

Funding to help kick start your Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSO). (All FFA, FCCLA, FBLA, SkillsUSA, Educators Rising, and HOSA chapters are eligible.)

Due: Oct. 18

Award Amount: \$1,000 - \$10,000



Perkins Funds Through District/Consortia

Purchase industry grade equipment to enhance your classroom and/or attend professional development to enhance the quality of your instruction. Cannot include installation costs or capital improvements. Due: Spring of the Year, (see local deadline) Award Amount: \$100 - \$10,000+



Perkins Reserve Grants

An extra-large boost of Perkins funds to support Perkins allowable costs for projects related to special populations, industrial alignment, or innovative delivery. Due: Feb. 1 Award Amount: \$10,000- \$50,000

Workforce Education Grants

Provide matched funding to school districts and private, nonprofit entities to make transformative change in career and technical education programs that partner with secondary education, postsecondary education, and business and industry. These grants fund major infrastructure such as construction projects or equipment.

Due March 15

Award Amount: Up to \$225,000 (matching funds required)



Collaborative Equipment Grants

Intended to support and modernize career and technical education (CTE) programs across South Dakota for multiple school districts that collaborate to expand CTE opportunities to more students.

Due: Oct. 6 or April 26

Award Amount: \$250,000 + (matching funds required)

Award amounts: \$250,000 +

Many of the careers listed on the Department of Labor's Top 30 Hot Careers are aligned with the training and programs offered at the four technical colleges. While these programs are already robust, providing knowledge, skills, and hands-on training, they continue to be improved upon and enhanced to ensure current industry standards are being taught and practiced. In addition, providing equal opportunities to students who are economically disadvantaged continues to be of focus and is becoming more available through grant funding, such as the Metallica Scholars Initiative recently awarded to Western Dakota Technical College.

Bridging the gap between the need for well-trained, highly skilled SD workforce and the affordability of obtaining high-quality training and education is essential and SD's technical colleges are making it happen.
