48% of Nevada workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in Nevada's key industries, like:

- health
- information technology
- transportation and logistics
- hospitality, tourism, sports and creative industries





In 2022, 72% of Nevada students passed Workplace Readiness Skills Assessments.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Nevada, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2021-22 school year, Nevada had:


