The South Carolina economy is experiencing a skills gap...

of jobs in South Carolina require skills training—
more education than high school but less than a four-year degree.

42% of South Carolina workers are trained at this level.

Career and technical education (CTE) programs can fill these gaps, particularly in South Carolina's key industries, like:

- advanced manufacturing and materials
- agribusiness
- electric vehicles
- distribution and logistics



In 2022, 66% of South Carolina high school CTE concentrators graduated with a recognized postsecondary credential.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in South Carolina, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2021-22 school year, South Carolina had:


