Georgia CTI provides personal and professional development opportunities for students with disabilities.

tudent leadership organizations stand as pillars of opportunity, providing invaluable experiences and skill development for students across the nation. They offer students an arena to refine and demonstrate the skills they have developed, bridging the gap between the career and technical education (CTE) classroom and real-world applications. Yet,

for students with disabilities (SWD), accessing these transformative programs is often fraught with challenges.



A unique program situated in the South, Georgia Career and Technical Instruction (Georgia CTI) is tailored explicitly for SWD. Georgia CTI is a testament to the visionary zeal of educators and administrators determined to bridge this gap. Together they are empowering SWD to pursue their college and career aspirations. It is the hope of this author that this pioneering effort signifies a paradigm shift, where students with disabilities are supported.

Promote meaningful learning opportunities.

Georgia CTI is a comprehensive program designed explicitly for students with a diverse range of disabilities. Student members attend conferences and competitions, and they often receive support services within their CTE courses. This results in higher rates of CTE pathway completion. EOPA pass rates are higher as well. Every aspect of Georgia CTI is intertwined and meticulously crafted to ensure inclusivity and provide meaningful learning opportunities. At the heart of it all lies a collaborative culture, from the local school level all the way to the partnerships forged between state agencies, the Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency (GVRA) and the Georgia Department of Education (DOE). These alliances have been instrumental in driving forward the mission of inclusivity in CTE for SWD, laying the groundwork for a more accessible and equitable educational and workforce landscape.

Leverage business and community partnerships.

Georgia CTI fosters a seamless continuum of support from the classroom to the workforce, setting students up for sustained success. GVRA plays a pivotal role in providing support services to SWD, facilitating their transition from school to the workforce. Through individualized guidance and resources, GVRA equips students with the tools they need to navigate the complexities of the job market. This partnership enhances Georgia CTI's efficacy, further bridging the gap between education and employment and fostering sustainable career pathways for SWD. Similarly, the collaboration with and support from the Georgia DOE underscores a shared commitment to advancing inclusivity in CTE. Through strategic initiatives and policy frameworks, the DOE champions the rights and aspi-



"The CTI program should be in every high school! This program builds confidence, empowers, and promotes leadership in its students. The program teaches students that they can accomplish their goals." -Justina


> **95%** of CTI students who graduate high school then enroll in postsecondary education or enter the workforce within a year.
