

CTE in Alaska



36% of Alaska jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Alaska industries such as:

- health care and social assistance
- accommodation and food services
- transportation and warehousing
- manufacturing



In 2023, 36% of Alaska high school CTE concentrators graduated with a recognized postsecondary credential.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Alaska, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Alaska had:

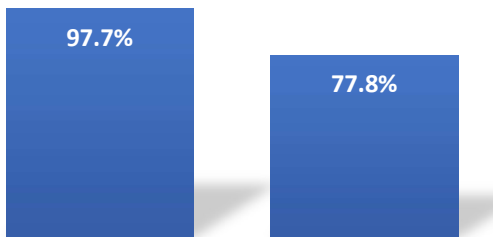
