CTE in Delaware

28% of Delaware jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Delaware industries such as:



- business and financial services
- food and agriculture
- manufacturing and logistics
- education and healthcare









In 2023, more than 3,500 Delaware high school CTE concentrators earned postsecondary credits.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Delaware, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Delaware had:


