CTE in Kansas

35% of Kansas jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key Kansas industries such as:

- advanced manufacturing
- corporate and professional services
- ag
- energy and natural resources



In 2023, more than 20,600 Kansas high school CTE concentrators attained postsecondary credits.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Kansas, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, Kansas had:


