- manufacturing and logistics
- healthcare
- construction
- education
- professional, scientific, and technical services











In 2023, almost 20,000 Kentucky high school CTE concentrators graduated with a recognized postsecondary credential.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in Kentucky, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. Kentucky had:


