CTE in South Carolina

34% of South Carolina jobs will require education beyond high school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key South Carolina industries such as:

- agribusiness
- aerospace
- electric vehicles
- life sciences



In 2023, more than 73% of South Carolina high school CTE concentrators graduated with a recognized postsecondary credential.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in South Carolina, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, South Carolina had:


