of West Virginia jobs will require education beyond high 31% school but less than a bachelor's degree by 2031. Career and technical education (CTE) programs prepare students for these jobs in key West Virginia industries such as:

- manufacturing
- food and agriculture •
- defense •
- film



In 2023, 97% West Virginia high school CTE concentrators pursued postsecondary education, joined the military or the Peace Corps, or entered the workforce immediately after graduation.

Many students are already enrolled in CTE in West Virginia, developing technical, academic and employability skills and engaging in work-based experiences with industry partners. During the 2022-23 school year, West Virginia had:


