## WHAT HAVE YOUR STUDENTS YOUR STUDENTS TAUGHT YOU TAUGHT YOU TAUG YEAR 3

My students work hard, but they know their limits, and they taught me to respect my limits better.

My students taught me to believe in myself. I told one of my students that I would be going out of town for a conference and that I would attend a fancy awards gala, and she asked if I would be receiving an award. I told her that I was one of the finalists but there was no chance I would win. She looked at me, disappointed, and said, 'Mrs. Kaler, you tell us all the time how creative, talented, and amazing we are! And you expect us to believe that we have great potential deep within us. Why do you not believe that you have great potential within yourself?'

"I was speechless! A 16-year-old had stopped me in my tracks. I was preaching something that I didn't practice. This was one of the biggest lightbulb moments of my entire career.

This year, my students have taught me that they learn best through experiences and meaningful connections. They've reminded me that relationships and relevance matter just as much as rigor. The most lasting learning happens when students see themselves reflected in what they're doing.

Don't forget to celebrate the small things, too. Years ago, one of my students was ready to call it quits. I remember the day he sat in a chair at my desk and started crying because he didn't see any other option but to quit school. He was behind on credits, had horrible attendance and discipline issues, and had recently become a father. I remember asking him if he would let me help.

"We worked on an action plan and decided to put a large calendar on the wall to track his progress. I reminded him that babies learn to crawl before they walk, and they take baby steps before they take big jumps. I celebrated each day he came to school. Those days turned into weeks, and the weeks turned into months. His grades improved and he ultimately graduated.

### An honor well deserved

Do you know an outstanding educator who is worthy of recognition? If you've ever considered nominating a colleague for an ACTE award, we hope you do! How you represent a candidate's accomplishments is critical in making the best impression on our judges. Here are some tips for making the most out of your nomination.

- Does your nomination address the criteria for the award? Looking at the rubric will give you an idea of what areas are most important.
- 2. Are you being descriptive enough with your candidate's achievements? How did the nominee contribute to the goal, and what were the end results? Include measurable outcomes or milestones where possible.
- **3.** What makes this candidate unique from others in the profession? Provide concrete examples.
- 4. Can you sum up in one sentence why the nominee deserves recognition? Keep your writing focused and make every word count.
- er to follow your train of thought? Identify how every point addresses the criteria for the award. Explain achievements in plain language. Judges may not be familiar with activities that are specific to your content area or program.
